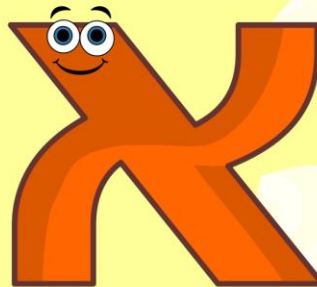
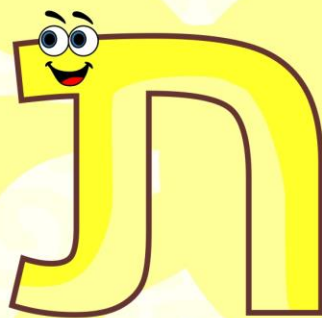

# He



The letter He, is pronounced as the He  
in Head.
